

program so it was instructive to see how it worked and have Philip's comments as well. Margot Watson and I completed the inspection team and Susan MacDougall was a trainee inspector.

We inspected nine ponies in all, including two stallions, some of which had come from as far as Salt Spring Island and Vancouver Island. Many thanks to the owners for supporting the program and presenting such well-prepared ponies. It makes our job inspecting so much easier when the ponies are well mannered and well turned out.

The inspection team quickly got used to the new program and under Philip's skilled guidance we had completed the inspection by early afternoon, including a discussion of each pony after inspection. Again, I would like to thank the owners for allowing us to discuss their ponies in front of our audience as this made it a very good educational experience for all. Philip was very helpful and knowledgeable in discussing the finer points of conformation and type and I think the inspection team gained useful information.

I hope to be able to get a complete list of all inspected and approved ponies in Canada, both ACPS and CCPS, on the web page shortly.

After a quick break we adjourned to Melanie's house for lunch and the AGM. Ten members were able to attend the meeting, although the number fluctuated a little as people were busy preparing ponies for the show the next day. We invited Philip to join us and enjoyed some interesting comments from him on inspections and showing as well as an offer to come again next year. This meeting was a consolidation of the

work that has been going on in committees this year. We approved the inspection program.

Doris Jacobi presented the Awards program which has been put together with the help of Nancy Page and myself. Presentations were made for the 2007 year to Balius Cardea for the Devonridge Purebred of the year, and the Half-Bred trophy was awarded to W.C. Celtic Legacy. Rills Carrick Fergus won the Lynfield's Mac-Carthy western award which is for western riding events in the Prairies region. We discussed an awards program for Hall of Fame Awards and struck a committee to look into finding donors and sponsors and writing criteria.

We had an interesting discussion on our newsletter and magazine. Rick Doner will be bringing out a fall edition of the newsletter again, this time mainly in black and white and distributed to members only. We discussed the importance of a printed newsletter as some members do not have email access or use it regularly. Jocelyn Davies suggested that we should look into the possibility of producing an annual colour magazine reporting on the achievements of our ponies over the year. Michael and Lesley Colgan from Salt Spring Island have experience in producing this sort of magazine and have volunteered to look into sponsorship, advertising and costs.

We approved the new webpage policy and the appointment of Tracy Dopko as webmaster. I hope you noticed the up-dated web page and will contribute news to Penny Huggons and Chris Carey for our new farm-news page.

Margot gave us a report of our financial situation and while we are still comfortably in the black, we decided we should raise our membership fees and some of our registration fees. While CLRC have done a wonderful job of get-

membership, we do pay for this work. If we are to have money to finance other programs for the society, we decided that, as our fees were some of the lowest of societies with CLRC, we should make some changes. The new fee schedule will be put on the web page shortly but the new fees don't come into operation until January 2009 so get your 2008 registrations in on time. In 2008 CLRC has so far registered 39 purebred ponies and 30 half-breds and there were 21 transfers. Finally, our 2009 AGM will be in Alberta. It was suggested that we hold it in September in Calgary in conjunction with Spruce Meadows and the Battle of the Breeds. We could also hold another inspection in Calgary and/ or Edmonton if we have sufficient ponies nominated. The idea of bringing another Irish inspector over to work with us was discussed but this will depend on the number of ponies to be inspected and the costs. The Irish have strongly suggested that we should use international inspectors in our program for at least a couple of years to insure we maintain correct standards and if we can manage to bring someone over again, we would also hold a clinic on Connemara type, conformation, breeding, and history.

PREMIUM AND ELITE PROGRAM-INSPECTIONS

The CCPS Inspection Program was passed at the 2008 AGM and we held our first inspections using this program the same day under the senior inspector, Philip Scott from Ireland. Details of the inspection program can be found on the website but I would like to mention two parts of the program that will be new to most members.

We have established a premium status for mares who score 75% or higher at their inspection. A mare has to be at least five years of age to gain a premium as we consider she should be mature at that age. Ponies that have passed inspection at ages two to four years can be represented for a premium after the age of five.

The pass mark for stallions is 75 % and after considerable discussion we decided not to institute a premium program for stallions. Interestingly, the CPBS has recently started a program for premium stallions but Philip

Scott said that many stallion owners are very reluctant to put their ponies up for a premium in case they do not make the grade. This reinforced our decision that once a stallion has passed inspection he should be considered of a high enough standard to improve or maintain the quality and type of ponies.

We have also instituted a new concept in the Elite Program which includes performance and progeny requirements. All stallions that have passed inspection are eligible for the program as are premium mares. For details of the requirements, refer to the inspection program on the webpage.

The performance requirements are for any discipline and points accumulated in the Achievement Awards Program can be used, as can results from any shows, tabulated using the Achievement Awards system. Stallions have to accumulate more points than mares as they have more opportunity to compete than a mare

who also has to produce foals. The progeny requirements are also higher for stallions than mares as they can produce more offspring in a lifetime. Offspring have to be purebred and have passed inspection to ensure that we are rewarding quality rather than just quantity.

Inspections are not mandatory and neither are the premium or elite programs. They are designed to encourage breeders to maintain the breed standard and high-quality ponies and at the same time to promote the breed through open competition. All ponies already passed under the ACPS program will be grandfathered into our program, including premium mares.

Applications for consideration for elite status should be sent to the Chair of the Inspections Committee and will be considered by the committee as a whole.

Avalon Horse Trials on Vancouver Island, and finished in 2nd place!!!! Look out

Shannon Thompson on her young Olympic hopeful - bay 7 year old purebred Connemara gelding "KS Priceless" (full brother to Coolmore) moved quickly through the levels in the pair's 1st year of eventing, with a 1st place in Training level at the Topline event in Salmon Arm. This followed on the heels of placing 2nd in the Training division at the Island 22 event a few weeks earlier, and 2nd again at Langley's Campbell Valley Event. Priceless is owned by the "Priceless Syndicate". Watch for this pair next year when they move up to the Preliminary level.

Simply Irresistible - a 7 year old bay 3/4

Connemara mare also had a successful season with 13 year old Ryan Varchol who placed 7th in the Pre-Training division at the Mt Cheam Event in Chilliwack early spring, to be followed with a third place finish Pre-Training at the June Johvale Event, and 4th place finish in the Training division at Topline in Salmon Arm. Ryan then passed his pony off to younger sister Alix, who began her Eventing career with an 8th place in the Pre-Entry division at the Island 22 Event in Chilliwack, and a 1st place finish at Topline this September!!!

Silverdale Covergirl – 8vr old 15.1hh Dark bay ½ Connemara, ½ Thoroughbred mare. Covergirl and her owner/rider Vicki Davies spent the season competing in events, hunter, jumper and dressage shows.....and even went out with "Simply Irresistible" and Sandra Varchol competing in a 24 mile endurance ride!!!!

Coolmore - 9 year old purebred Connemara (full brother to KS Priceless) bay 14.2hh gelding, ridden by 13 year old Elspeth McGillivray of Victoria B.C. This pair managed to win Pony Jumper champion, and Pony Hunter champion at the same show on Vancouver Island this summer!!!! They then headed to a dressage show in the lower mainland and managed to finish in 2nd place at Third Level!!....and of course against a herd of warmbloods!!! Just a few weeks later they finished in 2nd place at the Campbell Valley horse trials in Langley. Talk about versatile!!!!

points that he emphasized, both in the clinic and at the inspection, is that the horse should look all of a piece. It is easy to get so carried away with the details of conformation that one forgets to look at the overall picture and to ensure that all the pieces fit to make a horse that is overall well balanced as well as correct. We were lucky that a brave owner had let us use a horse that did not have perfect conformation so Philip could point out the good and bad features. Another thing he emphasized was the importance of noting the good points as well as looking for faults. Again this was important in our inspections the day before.

Philip then went on to demonstrate techniques in presentation and how important that can be to the final placing of a pony. Using a Connemara this time, he showed us how to train a pony to walk and trot forward with impulsion and how to walk it forward into a correct stance. It was amazing the difference professional presentation can make and easy to see how that could move a pony up a place or two.

Then it was turn out and how to make the most of your pony by careful grooming and presentation. He expects all ponies older than yearlings to be shown in bits, either with bridle or with the show halters seen in England and Europe. He suggested rather than reins, to use a lead shank with the chain run through the bit. This gives more control and with skill can make the pony present itself better as well as looking neat.

As for trimming native ponies, Philip told an anecdote of one pony he had that was never doing as well as he should in in-hand classes when shown with a long flowing mane, full feathers and no facial clipping. After tidving the mane to a length of about 6-8 inches, discreetly trimming the feathers

to show off the good fetlocks rather than hiding them, and again discreet trimming of beard and whiskers to show off the lines of his head, the pony started to consistently win. He does not advocate showing native ponies completely clipped and trimmed with severely pulled manes, but suggests that they should be groomed and trimmed to allow the judge to see their good points which can be hidden by too much mane. Tails should be tidily bandaged and again discreetly tidied to show off good hind quarters.

Judging, Philip maintains that one should spend an equal amount of time on every competitor and give them the chance to show their pony's attributes. In his classes, every pony was stood up individually for the judge, walked out and trotted back. Some of the larger classes took time, but his attention to each pony was obvious. He also says that a good judge never touches a pony while judging. He should be able to assess everything by viewing from a distance from all angles. Movement is important as was pointed out in his clinic, and the pony should be trained to show off a good free trot and forward walk.

The Extravaganza finished on Sunday with the performance classes, again judged by Philip. In the morning the flat classes were conducted much the same as the in hand classes the day before, with every pony giving a short individual show under saddle. After lunch it was jumping, culminating in the Gamblers' Choice class at 4ft. Each jump had a point value and riders had a set time to jump as many fences as they could, collecting points. Any fence could be jumped a maximum of twice, in either direction and there was a jeopardy jump of two vertical rails with a value of 200 points. A rider could choose whether to jump this at the end of his round – clear and you won 200 points, knock down and you lost 200 points.

Tension rose as the two Connemaras, Hillside

Sassafrass and Rory O'Sullivan competed against the much larger Irish Sport horses. Ponies do have the advantage of being able to turn much faster than the bigger horses and Rory and Sassie made full use of this. And both cleared the Jeopardy fence with Rory coming in first and Sassie second.

Canadian Connemara Pony Society Annual General Meeting July 25, 2008

Present: Melanie White, Jocelyn Davies, Bridget Wingate, Heather Sherratt, Michael Colgan, Lesley Colgan, Doris Jacobi, Margot Watson, Susan MacDougall, Phillip Scott (guest) Rita Rawston, Cheryl Miller, Penny Huggons.

1) President's Welcome & Remarks - Heather Sherratt welcomed everyone to the 3rd Annual Canadian Connemara Pony Society. She said it was a rather slow year, but we are gradually getting organized. The website is getting updated, Chris Carey and Penny Huggons are gathering news to be included regularly on the website. Jenny Smythe is going to the ICCPS meeting in Clifden, Ireland this year and has graciously offered to be the Canadian Representative. Heather also mentioned the ICCPS Vet Inspection Form that is currently being looked at and will be discussed at the upcoming ICCPS meeting. Right now it doesn't clarify what the vet is required to do exactly, especially regarding the soundness area (i.e. it is similar to a pre-purchase exam). Many are currently worried that fewer ponies will be inspected due to the cost of such an exam. Another topic to be discussed in Clifden at the ICCPS meeting is registration of prefixes and farm names. They will be discussing future rules for naming that will affect the registered names of all Connemara ponies. The Irish do not want a word used in a prefix or farm name to be used as part of any other pony's name. Many countries think this could cause problems. 2) Reading and Approval of 2007 Minutes - Jocelyn Davies read the 2007 minutes. Jocelyn proposed that the minutes be accepted as read. Susan MacDougall moved that they be accepted and Lesley Colgan seconded the motion.3) Treasurer's Report - Margot Watson passed out two Statements to everyone at the meeting. - one for year ending December 31st and the second one ending June 30th. She explained that there are two different bank accounts, the account for dealing with CLRC matters and our General Account. As of December 31, 2008 we had a combined cash balance of \$3,625.02, with an accounts payable owing to CLRC for December Fees of \$310.25. Margot proposed accepting the December 31 Statement as read/presented. Susan MacDougall moved to accept the Statement and Bridget Wingate seconded the motion. As of June 30, 2008 our combined cash balance of \$3,296.99 with an accounts payable of \$162.57 for CLRC June fees owing. Margot moved that we accept the June 30th Statement as presented. Doris Jacobi seconded the motion. CLRC - It was discussed how the payments went into our bank account and how CLRC sometimes had a delay pending completion of the registration before taking the payment out of the CLRC bank account as fees. It was also mentioned that our fees were very low in comparison to other breed associations that CLRC also represents. We decided we needed to reduce some of our expenses and raise some of our fees. Starting January 2009, we agreed to increase our CCPS fee structure as follows: Registration (including DNA) from \$65.00 to \$75.00 Registration (excluding DNA) from 20.00 to \$30.00 Permanent Registration for mares from \$20.00 to \$25.00 Stallions will remain at \$250.00 Duplicate Certificates from \$0.00 to \$25.00 Transfers will remain at 20.00

Transfers at time of registration will remain at \$20.00 Herd name registration will remain at \$25.00 Membership fees will be changed as follows: Adult ship - \$35.00

Junior - \$15.00 Associate - \$20.00, Non-resident - \$20.00. Stallion Reports - We decided that CLRC fees for stallion reports were too expensive but that keeping stallion reports was a good idea and they should be mailed to the CCPS Secretary to be kept for reference purposes only. Heather to obtain stallion report sheet. Inspection for Stallions - It was decided that stallions be inspected if they only have a temporary registration. However, none of their foals can be registered until permanent registration is obtained and there is no back registration of their foals. Margot moved that the changes for fee structure be accepted, Susan seconded the motion. 4) Report of Regional Chairs Susan MacDougall - Pacific Region - Susan said the Irish Extravaganza was the Pacific Regions biggest event which was going to be happening the weekend of this Annual Meeting. Also, thanks to Melanie offering her facility at the last minute and also to Margot for helping organize, they were going to be able inspect 10 ponies! Philip Scott the judge for the Irish Extravaganza agreed to help inspect the ponies and with the coordinating of funds from the owners, Pacific Region and National Society they were able to pull it off. The Irish Extravanza may need to look at a new facility and also make some changes for next year. This year it was found that fewer Americans were coming to the show and entries were down. Possibly rather than going with the Irish Draught Society, we could have a Mountain & Moorland show. It was thought that possibly each region should organize a Mountain & Moorland show or sponsor a Mountain & Moorland Class in an existing pony show. Penny Huggons - Prairie Region - Penny commented on how well some of our Connemaras in the Prairie Region were doing at the shows. Rills Finnian was the Pony Hunter champion at the A Circuit Edmonton Northlands Horse Show. He is also the pony with the most points on the ASJA Pony Medal standings for 2008. Rills Fergus has a new owner that is thrilled with him... he was in the ribbons at the Beaumont Eventing Show in June this year. Bantry Bay Dillon was Reserve Champion Jumper at the Caledonia Show at Amberlea this past May as well. There is also a Rising Sun gelding in Saskatchewan that is doing very well in pony club and local competition. Penny also mentioned that the Prairie with the Pacific region is getting busy organizing their team for Team Connemara at the Battle of the Breeds competition at Spruce Meadows. Bridget Wingate is our team captain again this upcoming year and it looks like we will have a nice competitive team. Rick Doner - Central Region - No report from Rick as things have been very quiet in the East. Heather mentioned that Rick & Dale purchased a nice new stallion prospect last year and has had one foal this year by Wildwych Eclipse.5) Report and discussion on Inspections Program - Presented by Heather Sherratt Full details will be on our website. Premium mares need an inspection score of 75% or more. There will be no "premium" stallions, however they will be eligible for the "Elite" program. The Elite program will be similar to the British system which combines progeny and performance. This elite program will be promoted in our newsletter & website for our members. Trainee Inspectors - need to decide on an appropriate training program.. One idea was the Judy Wardrope conformation clinic and also her on line course. Heather moved that we accept the inspection forms and program as it is, with a resolution that it can be improved/changed in the future as required. Margot seconded the motion .6) Awards Program - Presented by Doris Jacobi Doris explained the new Awards Program. All members/owners of ponies in the Awards Program gram will have to be made aware of the new rules through the Newsletter and website. It is also important for breeders/owners to send a copy of the new program when selling a pony so that the new owners will continue with the program and continue to accumulate points for the pony. NOTE: To be eligible to accumulate points owners must be members of the CCPS. Lifetime Awards - Sponsors are needed. Heather will talk to Dale for the Eastern region. Michael Colgan volunteered for the Pacific Region and the west will ask Elsie Priddy for the Prairie Region. Purebred Performance Award was awarded to Balius Cardia, Owner: Melanie White. Lynfield Cormac MacCarthy Award was awarded to Rills Carrick Fergus, owner at time of points - Elsie Priddy. 7) Web Page - Presented by Susan MacDougall Web Page -Contracts for the webpage are in the process of being signed now. Cost for Webpage upgrade is \$800.00 to Tracy Dopko. Other annual costs are \$200 paid semiannually "July & January. Domain Name cost is \$200.00. We are working on news for the webpage, lots of ideas! Policies will be put on the webpage. Internet Policy needs to be amended to include Sponsorship advertisement. 8) Magazine/Newsletter - Report by Rick Doner, presented by Heather Sherratt For the second Newsletter sent February 2008, 116 copies were sent out. Cost was significant. For the fall newsletter it was decided that only members would receive it (approx 50). It also will be downloadable off of the website for those who want more copies. It should be only part colour with mostly black & white to keep the cost down.. Sponsorship is a way also to help with the cost. We should include basic information in the newsletter, such as AGM minutes, awards program, farm news, etc. There was a suggestion we could have an Annual magazine similar to the English Chronicle, listing stallions, performance, farm advertising, lots of sponsors, etc. Michael Colgan volunteered to help organize the publication of this. Our plan is to put out our first publication in Fall of 2009. It is estimated that this will cost \$10.00 - \$15.00 per copy. All felt this would be a great way to keep a record of history of Connemaras in Canada. We have some very good articles of some wonderful Canadian ponies in the past that could be brought forward and published. Poster - Margot and Susan to organize a CCPS poster. Something that we could download from the website for breed/ promotional shows, etc. 9) Archives and historical Records for Society - Jennifer Smythe No Report 10) Report on Arbitration Committee - Bridget Wingate Bridget says she is happy to report there are no complaints at the moment. 11) CLRC - Report by Ron Black, Presented by Heather Sherratt Ron Black wrote a report from the CLRC for the CCPS and Heather read his report. As of July 16th CCPS has 54 members, increase from 42 from 2007. We have 39 purebred ponies registered, 30 HB Ponies, and applications in progress for 25 additional animals. Already in 2008 there have been 21 transfers (mostly animals that were sold prior to being registered). Laura Lee Mills is the designated Registrar for Connemara Ponies. Note: 2 photos are needed for "Purebred" permanent registration. There is the 2009 CLRC Workshop and Annual Meeting in Toronto on April 25th 2009. We are encouraged to attend this meeting. We will ask Rick Doner to attend this. 13) Connemara Store - Val Everson, presented by Heather Sherratt Val Everson is looking after this... so far nothing to sell. We discussed having orders go through our webpage through Tracy Dopko our Webmaster. T-Shirts - Jocelyn mentioned that she had ordered some t-shirts from E:Bay that had a very good price and that maybe we could order on an as-need basis. She will look into this. 14) Report of Nominating Committee and Election of Board of Governors There were 17 Votes received 15) Results of Elections for 2008 Pacific - Margot Watson - 17 votes Prairie - Bridget Wingate - 17 votes Central Region - Heather Sherratt - 17 votes. It was proposed by Bridget Wingate that the ballots be destroyed. This was seconded by Susan MacDougall. 16) Appointment of Chair of Nominating Committee for 2009 Penny Huggons graciously accepted this appointment 17) Any other business - No other business was brought forward to discuss

18) Date and Place of AGM 2009 - Tentative place and date are Calgary, Alberta, early September (coordinated with the Spruce Meadows Masters Tournament and Battle of the Breeds. It is also hoped to plan more Alberta inspections at this time. 19) Meeting Adjourned - Penny motioned that the meeting be adjourned at 6:15 pm and Lesley Colgan seconded the motion. 

The first competition was compulsory skills with a driven dressage test where at the last halt Melonie had a rein hook under the point of the shaft which distracted Cardea. "Peso" was very tense for Erin and did not score well, so we were not in the ribbons.

The jumping competition in the afternoon went much better. The organizers had made somewhat of an error having the jeopardy jump too high (?4ft) and only 4 of the 28 competitors attempted it. Erin was first to go on "Peso" and declined the jeopardy. Brian was very confident on Rory and after a clear round took the jeopardy in style, being only one of two competitors to clear it. At 13.2 hh Rory was one of the smallest horses in this competition, and the crowd responded accordingly! We placed 2nd behind the Thoroughbreds who had also cleared the last fence.

On Friday there was good crowd to watch the obstacle driving. This was a very difficult course with a water obstacle (which Cardea jumped!), a ditch, a compulsory 3 second halt

and a painted circle to be straddled by the wheels. Both Cardea and Rory went well and Connemaras finished 5th.

Barrel racing is always a popular event, and there was a big crowd despite cold and rain. Good times in the first run put our team of Rory and Fergus in the top 6 run-off. Unfortunately Fergus and Caitlin had a barrel down which added 5 seconds to their score, and left us in 6th place.

The trail class on Saturday morning is always very early, but there was a good crowd at the ring-side. There were several new obstacles and there again the organizers had made a very difficult choice of the jeopardy with trotting rails. Only those who had nothing to loose attempted this win/loose 100 points obstacle. Rory and Fergus both had quite good scores, but it is hard to beat the Mules and Quarter Horses at this game and we placed 6th.
