

Please make sure your achievement forms are complete with proof of your placings and scores or a signed copy from the show committee. Incomplete forms will not be accepted to enter points for the program.



News from Canter By Farm

In 2010 we were introduced to Rick and Dale Doner, owners of Century Hill Connemaras in Beaverton, Ontario. They asked if we could put some training on their 5-year-old Connemara stallion, Kippure Cara.

We started working with Cara who had only been lightly driven and backed a couple of times. We found him very eager to learn and he loved any new challenges we set before him. The Doners were lovely people who were easy to work with and they enjoyed watching Cara's progress throughout his training at our Canter By Farm.

Because Cara learned so quickly it was only 8 months before we found ourselves off to a combined show at Grandview Eventing Farm where we entered Cara to compete in the Entry level. This was his first-ever event and out of 14 horses he finished the day placing first on his dressage mark. We took Cara to two other eventing competitions in 2011 and he enjoyed all three disciplines and placed well.

In July 2011, Rick and Dale planned to take Cara to the ACPS Region 1 Breed show in Woodstock, Vermont. We had such a great time at this show and found everyone there so friendly and helpful. Cara was a perfect gentleman and it showed throughout his performances. We were all so proud of Cara as he received the following placing and awards:

- Grand Champion Connemara of Show
- Reserve Champion Stallion in hand
- 1st place Dressage in training level
- 1st place Working Hunter over fence 3'
- 1st place Pleasure Driving
- 1st Place Senior Trial

Cara was a recipient of following:

- Lambay Seamus Trophy Champion
- Working Hunter Sue Dexter Memorial Versatility Award
- Greenway Trophy
- Kilronan Pleasure Driving
- RHF O'Harazan Perpetual Trophy
- Grand Champion

It was a wonderful trip and an experience that we have fond memories of.

In the late spring of 2011 the mares had given birth to that years' new crop of foals. Rea had a lovely colt by Cara and Dale emailed to inform us that he was Amanda's favourite colour. That certainly peeked our curiosity and we were off to Beaverton to see what Dale was talking about. Since the foals' father, Cara and his mother, Rea are both dapple grey, we certainly were quite surprised when we arrived at Century Hill Farm and looked



into the stall to find a gorgeous palomino colt standing next to Rea. Seeing his white mane and tail against his golden colour it was "love at first sight" and we just had to have him! When he was old enough to be weaned, we brought our newest member of the family home to our farm. He fit right in with our other two horses and now is just "one of the boys".

We then began the time consuming and thought provoking challenge of finding a name to suit our new baby. Amanda has a palomino thoroughbred named "Paint Me Gold", aka Trigger, whom she has owned for 21 years. Trigger's job changed from being a racehorse to becoming an eventer. Amanda successfully competed for many years in eventing with Trigger and enjoyed taking him to the North America Young Rider Championship competition in 2002 to Illinois and to Bromont, Quebec in 2003 as members of the Ontario Eventing team. We wanted to include Trigger's registered name somehow into the new golden boys' and with lots of ideas and suggestions to

consider, the one that was the most favourite was "Gold Not Silver" as his registered name and his barn name to be "Goldie". It seemed to be the name that suited our new colt the best as both his



parents are grey and he is definitely a "horse of a different colour".

During his first winter at our Canter By Farm, Goldie got to hang around with his new pals, one of who is Princey, another OTTB, and they are the best of buddies. Since Princey is a gelding that loves to play halter tug of war and play fight, their paddock time together gave Goldie some social skills and manners.



Time has passed quickly and the young foal is now 2 years old and has grown into a playful, robust colt that loves to spend his days romping with Princey or just chilling with 28-year-old Trigger. We have chose to not geld him yet at this point in time, but he is still well behaved thanks to the gentle correction in equine etiquette from his two best pals. Goldie enjoys his 40" play ball we bought for him and he loves to chase it around his paddock. In July 2012, Goldie and his brother West took a short road trip together to Paddock Lane Farm on Concession 13 in Oro-Medonte. After playing, frolicking and eating in the pasture, the two colts

enjoyed a warm bath and it was a great first trip experience.

Amanda has started Goldie's training and he has willingly accepted being lunged, ground driven, and also bridled and saddled. Goldie also trailers, baths, clips and stands for the farrier (most of the time) and he thinks everyone is there to admire him and loves all the attention he gets. This coming winter we are sending Goldie off to Jeff Kohler at Relhok Farm for the start of "Driving 101". If he is going to follow in his father Cara's hoof prints, Goldie should be willing and accepting of the driving training Jeff challenges him with.

Elphin Mountain Connemaras - 2013

After twenty-three years breeding Connemaras here at Elphin Mountain Farm, I have decided it is time to downsize. Advancing age and old injuries are catching up with me and that, combined with the still-soft market, has convinced me that I need to sell some of my mares and reduce the breeding program.

When I started in 1990 there were very few Connemaras in eastern Canada. I was fortunate to find Mick in Quebec and my first mares in NY State. The choice in those days was limited, communications slow, and importing ponies expensive and difficult. My first mares, Oak Hills Gold Friday and her daughter SP Mils Breaban (by Aladdin's Owen), were from old-style traditional bloodlines and Mick put more quality on their foals without losing their ruggedness. Later I did import a mare, *Scottsway Lullaby (Kirtling Tam O'Shanter x Hobbans Lark), who has proved to be a true blue hen mare for me.

I couldn't have found a better stallion than Mick for bloodlines, temperament and athletic ability. Now twenty-four years old, he is still siring good foals and managing the farm from his paddock in front of the house. Over the years he must have sired well over a hundred foals, pure and partbreds. He has crossed well with just about any mare from thoroughbreds

and warmbloods to Welsh ponies and Kirsten's part Fjord mare, adding quality, athletic ability and good sense to his foals.

This spring, however, I decided would be the last I would stand Mick. It is increasingly difficult to find the help I need in this area and the stallion station where I collect for AI might also be downsizing. It seemed time to make decisions and changes here.

I have several youngsters and proven brood mares for sale, including two of Abby's fillies, Millie's daughter Rosie, and Aluinn de Haoine's daughter Daisy (all by Mick). Wildwych Clio, who I bought a few years ago, is also for sale along with her two offspring by Mick. All are on my webpage www.elphinfarms.com.

Mick's foals, grandfoals and great-grandfoals are doing well across Canada and the States, both competing and breeding. I would like to see a son of Mick and Abby standing as a stallion, but they seem to be consistently producing beautiful fillies. Since I started breeding, the number of Connemaras and their breeders has increased greatly in eastern Canada although the numbers competing seems to be down from the time Mick was eventing, when there could be up to four purebred stallions all showing together.

Being very protective of her small critters, Eddie asked me to find a good home for May Girl. My friend, Marilyn Kubinec, came to the rescue. May Girl was picked-up and taken to the 400 acre farm that Marilyn and her husband Mike own. Once there, May Girl was given a choice area in which to live. She was no longer a cocky little brat and had decided that patting and brushing were good things for ponies and that pockets sometimes held something tasty - if you stood back and minded your manners. Mike and Marilyn's granddaughter took a lot of interest in "the filly." When her mother Vera Lynn drove out from Winnipeg to ride her horse, Jane would make a beeline for May Girl. One day

"the filly" discovered a missing top rail and proved that Connemaras make great jumpers! She had spotted the other horses on the property - geldings in another pasture, that included one aggressive young upstart who let everyone know that around that pasture he was "head honcho." I learned about May Girl's shennanigans and drove out to Kubinec's farm. Marilyn excitedly blurted "Jeannie Pie", she jumped that fence!" I was confused - she didn't sound angry; she sounded impressed! Once the railing was replaced there weren't any further jumping derbys, but it was felt that May Girl deserved a herd that she could fit into and hopefully find a rider of her own.

Marilyn phoned Catherine McCullagh of Quarry Ridge Farms to offer "the filly". Marilyn assured Catherine that May Girl was a good pony, nicely built with a friendly disposition - and that she could jump!! Catherine said "I really don't need anymore ponies right now, but perhaps I could keep her for a couple of weeks to see if she fits in here." Arrangements were made for Lee Phobes to pick-up and deliver May Girl to Quarry Ridge. Jane was at Grannys for a sleep-over on the evening that Lee was coming and was very distressed to hear that the filly was leaving. She sobbed "Granny, you can't send the filly away!! Oh boy! I was ready to call out "Unload her; Jane can have her - but the truck and trailer were already pulling out of the driveway. I watched the rig leave and silently called after her - "Go and sell yourself May Girl; please show Catherine that the pig in a poke she has coming is really a little diamond! Strangely enough, Jane's mother Vera Lynn, phoned later that night to express interest in May Girl for herself. Marilyn said "Well, you are too late; Lee Phobes came earlier this evening, to pick her up and take her to Quarry Ridge.

The two weeks "on approval" passed, but each time Catherine mentioned paying me for May Girl, I came-up with another excuse for why she shouldn't yet. (Once the deal was finalized, I wouldn't have any reason to keep going to Catherine's barn, right?) Seeing through my thinly-veiled strategy, Catherine assured me that I would still be welcome at the barn. I happily accepted payment for May Girl! When Catherine told me that her youngest son, Kieran, wanted May Girl for his next mount I was beside myself! Another Connemara out in the Show Ring and all of the fun events at Quarry Ridge to watch them take part in! May Girl was sent to Tiffany Gibbons in October of 2012 to put some of those important first rides on her and it wasn't long before Tiffany phoned Catherine, to say that May Girl was safe for Kieran to get on. Tiffany added "It

didn't take very many rides to get her to that point." I wasn't able to go along to see Kieran's first ride unfortunately, but Catherine e-mailed me that night to say that May Girl trotted and cantered for Kieran like an old pro. Catherine added "She was wonderful!". My friend Fran and I were sitting in the bleachers at Quarry Ridge indoor arena, when Kieran did his second ride on May Girl since bringing her home from training. We couldn't believe our eyes when we saw Catherine lay down some poles. That went fine so a couple of cross-rails came next. Brennan, Kieran's older brother, called out "Wow Kieran, you just got her back and you two are jumping already!

May Girl has fully morphed from a cheeky brat into a typical kind and gentle Connemara - she is very willing and likes to move it, move it. So in what way has May Girl become a Star? A two day Dressage and Jumping Clinic taught by Kareena Harvey of British Columbia was held at Quarry Ridge last November. I was recovering from eye surgery, so I couldn't attend. An excited message arrived from Catherine on the first night. She

said "Kareena just loves her!" She added "May Girl is being the absolute Star of the Clinic!"

Over the past winter I thought a lot about the upcoming Show season. Would Kieran and May Girl be ready? A Schooling Clinic in April of 2013 at Eric and Danae Martin's East Ridge Farm, at Oak Bank, Manitoba, went extremely well. May Girl warmed-up with Kieran in the outdoor arena all by herself while leaves and debris blew wildly all about. She went around the course on Saturday without incident. We all held our breath on Sunday as she approached the bank! She jumped up the bank without any hesitation and calmly jumped down the other side. Again she was a Star and she impressed the Clinician! I had my answer -Yes, they are ready!

What May Girl led to:

Watching everyone else riding and taking part in Clinics at the barn made me long to be able to take part myself and not just be an observer. I had broken my back three years prior, so I knew that if there was any hope of my riding again, I needed

someone willing to watch over me. Where could one find such an Angel? One day Catherine casually mentioned "You know Jeannie, I think Fran would make a great riding partner for you and I think that Flokie, an Icelandic, would be just the right mount to get you back into the saddle". She softly added "You need to ride."

The first ride on little 14 hand Flokie was terrifying - the ground looked like it was a half mile down! I inwardly chastised myself for being so crazy to try this. However, old habits quickly kicked in and I was soon picking-up my post! Catherine has brought me along to jump 2.3" and I even got a second place ribbon at a Quarry Ridge Clinic and Dressage Show. (Not too shabby for an old girl who has ridden western for most her life - this English riding sure isn't easy, but I love the challenge and the rush of coming up to a jump!)

With gratitude, then, I lift up my glass to Marilyn for finding the perfect home, to Catherine for providing a home barn, a chance to be involved with Pony Club, riding lessons and finally to May Girl herself, for bringing about all of these great things! I have to wonder though.....was the original name of May Gift really a premonition of the exciting things that pony would lead me to in my life?

The continued adventures of Alex & his pony Rill's Hot Sauce (aka Gus the "wonder pony ")

I just wanted to give you an update on Hot Sauce. Well, to sum it up, everyone is calling him the "wonder pony" I don't even know where to start since the last time I wrote you. He has progressed so quickly, and is so amazing, the only thing holding him back is my English riding skill level. Luckily both Alex and myself are in weekly lessons with a great coach. Alexander has been taking 2 lessons a week, one private and one group lesson every week. He has even been cantering on Hot Sauce since April. That pony takes it all in stride. Of course he moves differently for Alex than me, as we are at a different skill level, and Alexander's legs barely come below the saddle flaps, but he is calm and happy to pack an 8 year old around!

I take one lesson a week and ride him 5-6 times a week. On his day off he follows me around while I muck his paddock and stands at the gate wondering why we are not riding today. Most of my serious riding through out my life was western, so it has been a bit of a learning curve into the English discipline, but I am really enjoying it. He is so supple and moves so nice. His canter is starting to become more balanced, I canter a lot with a light seat, as he is very young, and we want him to learn how to use his hind end. He is so willing, and has such an amazing temperament, ok I know I have said that before, but I just can't say it enough.

Last weekend, we took him to his first schooling show. It was the West Kootenay Dressage Show. First time out of his bubble which is my farm. First time in a trailer since he got here. First bath, time arriving at a show grounds with horses and trailers, and a people everywhere. I was a little worried that he would be spooky and hot at all the new things, so we took him there a day early to let him settle in. He took it all in stride. I took him in 2 walk trot dressage tests, and Alexander also took him in two walk trot tests. He was actually on the lazy side, because I think he was just so mentally exhausted from everything that had been thrown at him over the past week leading up to it. But I am so happy with how

he did, I would take lazy over hot and spooky for his first show any day. That way we left there with a totally positive experience for him. He actually does have a lot of impulsion, but again, on show day, he was just really tired. Having said that, he still impressed everyone! We each got a first and a second place. He scored 66.7 % on his first test ever!

The judge was Dale Irwin. He is a level 3 dressage coach, but is also high up in the jumping world. He was second in line to coach the USA Olympic jumping team. The two days following the show, Dale taught a clinic. When I told him that this pony has only had 4 months under saddle, he couldn't believe it. He also couldn't believe that he packed an 8 year old through 2 dressage tests at his first show. He had no idea when he was scoring him, that he was only just started recently. He was so impressed with him. He said we are going to have so much fun with this pony. We worked on freeing him up, and engaging his hind end more. He had a lot more energy for the clinic after a good nights rest.

Hot sauce was so happy to come home Monday night. He got out of the trailer and ran into his paddock. He rolled in the dirt and galloped up and down the fence, he just couldn't believe he was home! I'm giving him the rest of this week off. It's raining pretty hard, so riding would be miserable anyway.

Well I could go on and on about this pony... but I better wrap it up! Hope all is good on your farm and take care!

Report from Clifden 2013



The International Connemara Pony Show is an annual event in Clifden, Connemara. The show grounds are in the town itself, and rooms need to be booked far in advance due to the show's popularity. Many exhibitors park their horseboxes outside of town and ride or lead their ponies in as parking is at a premium. There are two grass rings about 60 x 100 metres or so. One end of one ring is festooned with flags of the different Societies including our Maple

Leaf. There's a small two-storey building where the show organizers work, with outside seating but apart from one line of benches around the ring, there are no bleachers.

On the first day, the in-hand or line classes as we call them are viewed by spectators four or five rows deep so it's sometimes hard to see. I met people from Germany, Sweden, France, Belgium, NZ, Australia, Canada and the U.S. It's a real family affair with everyone on the sidelines judging too, and keen to see the winners strut their stuff after the prizegiving. The Irish men, who mostly do the handling are very fond of their ponies. There were many entries in the catalogue but not all show up, so the classes seemed to run from 12 to 16 ponies. This show is meant to be a showcase, so with that in mind, the owners are looking to market their animals to suit the taste of buyers. I think that is why most of them are grey, and the young stock a bit

fat or what they call "show fit". In fact, the two-year

old colts looked like three year-olds to me. Some of the stallions were very attractive, and I'm glad to say that a bay placed third. I was told that there is colour prejudice in the in-hand classes and ridden classes so that a good animal can be placed down if he's not a grey. Some people told me that breeders were trying to go back to the older style of pony while others said they were trying to suit the present-day market.

The show ran late until nearly 8 pm the first day. It was fun to see some of the ridden classes including



the side-saddle ponies. They are shown in all types of bits from snaffles to Pelhams to double bridles. The second day is for the "working hunter" ponies, so the two rings are joined together by a roped passage. The course is a mixture of nice hunter rail jumps, coloured poles, x-country steps, up onto a sand bank with one stride over a rail and drop, then into the adjoining river on one side of the ring, about twenty feet along the river and into the ring again to finish over a few more jumps. Not exactly what we would call "working hunter"! This went on most of the day with the usual thrills and spills. Not every Connemara likes water!! We had to leave at 4 pm so we missed the day's highlight of Susan Oakes beating her own record jumping side-saddle, and the pony and rider who jumped easily over 5 ft. in the Puissance, and the German carriage team of four-in-hand. There are pictures of all of these on the Connemara Pony Breeders website.

We visited some of the small bays in the area when we left. Looking out to sea reminded me a bit of Cape Breton and Newfoundland with the scraggy rocks and terrain along the shore. I realized how localized the ponies used to be, many generations staying in the same locality.

Rick Donner is hopeful he may be able to re-print the series of CCPS newsletters that were lost. Copies of AGM minutes, reports and agendas also need to be replaced, as well as past equine magazine articles featuring Canadian Connemara ponies and their owners.

Jennifer had also been photographing the stallions, mares, facilities and owners at Connemara studs in Alberta, Ontario and Quebec to date, and collecting stallion advertisements and business cards/brochures etc. for display in 3 ring binders for Western and Eastern Canada. As these were also flood casualties, a new set of binders are now needed to assist in promoting Connemara Ponies in Canada.
