HWSD Meeting in Clifden Ireland

Members of the International Connemara Pony Research Group who travelled to Clifden were an International Group bought together using the power of the internet to research the condition now known as HWSD in the Connemara Pony. Most of us had never met before & members travelled from New Zealand, Germany, Canada, USA & Ireland.

Dr. Finno, Ray Knightly & Sheila Ramsey were presenters at the public information meeting hosted by the Research Group.

SO NOW WHAT?

The major take home message from the HSWD meeting held in Clifden, is that Carriers must NOT be removed from the gene pool. If the ponies are of breeding quality they have to be kept within the breeding

programme. Culling animals because of Carrier status is counterproductive to the breed.

It is not a personal reflection upon breeders if they find their ponies are HWSD carriers.

The test is available from UC Davis & is happening now with results already being made public.

Educated buyers are going to want to know the HWSD status of potential breeding stock in order to avoid breeding Carriers together & so risking getting an affected foal.

Dr. Carrie Finno received her DVM from the University of Minnesota (UMN) in 2004. She completed an internship in large animal medicine and surgery at UMN in 2005 and then went on to complete a 3-year residency in large animal internal medicine at the University

of California, Davis (UCD), culminating in board-certification in the American College of Veterinary Internal Medicine. Dr. Finno elected to pursue a career in equine genetic research and obtained her PhD under the guidance of Dr. Danika Bannasch in 2012 from UCD. She then moved back to UMN and completed a 1-year post-doctorate fellowship with Drs. Stephanie Valberg and Jim Mickelson.

Dr Finno is now an Assistant Professor of Veterinary Genetics at UC Davis. Her research focuses on using next-generation sequencing tools to study various genetic diseases.

The diseases under study include Hoof Wall Separation Disease (HWSD), equine neuroaxonal dystrophy/equine degenerative myeloencephalopathy (NAD/EDM), equine shivers, myofibrillar myopathy and immune-mediated myositis. In conjunction with the equine studies, she is researching the interaction of vitamin E and neural development, using a well-established mouse model.

Hoof Wall Separation Disease

(HWSD)

Public Meeting

Proudly organised by the Connemara Pony Research Group Over the past 15 years there has been an increasing awareness worldwide of a problem with the hoof structure in a subset of our beloved Connemara ponies.

Hoof Wall Separation Disease is an **autosomal recessive genetic disorder** of the hoof wall. All four feet will be affected. It should not be confused with White Line Disease (WLD)

The condition has been identified in all countries where Connemara ponies are bred, in both local and imported stock - not 'one' country nor one bloodline. Currently HWSD is still not recognised by the breed societies even though the cause has been identified beyond all doubt.




If a pony has inherited this condition, it will be born with it, and in severe cases damage can be seen in foals as young as 2 -3 weeks of age. HWSD is not an acquired condition.

We are unsure why, but there is consensus that there are degrees of severity with this condition; some can be managed and some of these ponies need to be euthanised on humane grounds. Environment and nutrition may be contributing factors, but are not the *cause*.

The cause is a genetic mutation which causes the hoof wall grow in a defective manner. Splits occur within the layers of the hoof wall and these layers break away when they come in contact with the ground.

The Patterns of Inheritence in HWSD follow basic Mendelian principles.



Carrier parents donate either a normal copy of the gene or a mutated version to each of their foals.

Thus every mating of a carrier parent has a 50% chance that the foal will be free of the mutation and a 50% chance it will be a carrier.

When two carrier parents are mated, the chance of producing a HWSD foal is 1:4.

When an affected HWSD parent produces a foal, 100% of the offspring will be of carrier status.

By genetic testing all breeding stock for the HWSD mutation, it will be possible to avoid matings which will have the potential to produce HWSD affected foals.

Dr. Robert Eustace of the Laminitis Trust (UK), originally described the condition as "coconut-matting hooves" as the borders of the hoof wall appears rough and frayed like the edges of coconut matts.



HWSD sadly, does not respond to treatment whether topical hoof treatments or feed supplements which are used to promote healthy hoof growth.



The hooves do not hold traditional shoes well, as the hoof wall fractures around the nail sites. The older type of adhesives used for 'glue on shoes' appear to exacerbate the breakdown of the hoof wall. The new generation adhesives appear to perform better in this regard.

Report from the Prairie Region

It is great to see more Connemaras & part breds being enjoyed in Manitoba. Many thanks to all of you involved in showing & promoting the pony there. Keep up the good work!

In Saskatchewan the Hunter Pace Trials being hosted by the Priddy family are steadily gaining in popularity. It is fun to see some Connemaras & part breds participating . Connemaras are becoming better known there too, thanks to Elsie & her Elodon ponies.

There are some very busy farms in Alberta, namely Devon Ridge & Drogheda. Connemaras continue to make in roads into the showing scene in many disciplines here & there are some enthusiastic new owners.

Unfortunately there will not be a regular Battle of the Breeds this year at Spruce Meadows. There is a trimmed down version as the final Battle being held at Spruce. As there will be only Tail & Barrels we will not be putting forward a team. We have had 20 great years promoting our ponies at Spruce Meadows & we will all miss the Battle.

This recognition by such a knowledgeable & respected person in the world of Connemara Ponies was the best compliment we could have received.

Being a Connemara Breeder has been an amazing journey & when I got into breeding over 25 years ago I never imagined that 2 breeders in Alberta would play such a big part in a huge genetic breakthrough.

<u>Fall Report for Eve Dedrick</u> <u>and Devon Ridge Harris Hawk</u>

Eve and Harris kicked off the season early this year when they attended the Thunderbird Gateway Series which took place in January, February and March. They placed well in every show and ended up tied for third at the series' end (and that would have been second if Eve had not gone off course in one of her classes in the January show - but hey, I bet we all can say that about some of our horse shows). Eve and Harris did their first 'bigger' show of the year at Maple Ridge in April where they won two pony hunter classes right off the bat (and had another off course!).

That same weekend they stopped by the BCLM regional Pony Club D Camp to showcase the Connemara breed - Eve got on and rode Harris while Eve's mom did a little talk on the history of the Connemara, the conformation of the Connemara, famous Commemaras, and then they showed the campers some of the medals and certificates that Harris had won through the Connemara Club. The good news is, one participant at the camp immediately went out, researched Connemaras, and found one! We have already run into this new pair out at Rally, and it looks like it will be a good partnership.

But back to the horse shows: Eve and Harris continued to do well through spring, competing at various shows primarily in hunters, but also adding jumpers to their repertoire. At the Delta Riding Club May show, they ended up with a division championship in hunters (competing primarily against horses) and in June they started something completely new: eventing.

At the Southlands Riding Club's June event in Vancouver, the pair was third after dressage, and ended up with a stop and time penalties in cross country, but there were so many eliminations and penalties for other competitors that the pair only moved back to sixth, and a clear round in stadium saw them move up to fifth for their final placing.

In July, they attended the Pony Club regional Rally, and started off strongly in second place in dressage. Unfortunately

there was a bear visiting the course which made a number of competitors a bit nervous, and Eve and Harris were no different. They jumped clear in cross country but finished with time penalties. A clear round in stadium saw the pair finish in 3rd place. Harris was also the horse chosen by their team for the Captain's round, where he put in a clear round under a strange rider.

July started off with a lot of learning at Pony Club camp, and upcoming is another big event: the Pacific National Exhibition (or PNE), which is a three week long fair in Vancouver. August 20th will be Horse Day at the PNE, and both the Connemara Club and the Pony Club will be represented there by Harris and his friend Honey (Allie Ivory) in the jumping demo.

We had one foal this year, a grey colt by Century Hills Aedan Zodiac out of Castlebar Gaelic. Connor is the tallest purebred foal we've ever had and one of the most laid back. He is a joy to handle.



Suffering the same wet, miserable spring as a lot of Canada, we had a slow start but did make it to four shows in July and August. Our stallion Century Hills Aedan Zodiac is becoming quite a seasoned hunter, regardless of his amateur rider. The highlight for me was coming second in an Open 2'6' Handy Hunter Derby (with 2'9" options) out of 18 horses.


Elphin Mountain Farm Spring 2014

This spring, in line with my decision to try to cut back on the number of ponies here, I only had one foal although I really prefer to have at least two to grow up together. Jack was born early May and Abby, as usual very considerate, had everything efficiently tidied up before midnight. He is Mick and Abby's thirteenth foal so she has had plenty of practice, but he's only the fourth colt and proving to be one of the nicest this pair have produced.

Abby is one of the most efficient mares I have come across. She is fiercely protective of her foal for about three days but after that is happy to hand him over to nanny mare Dee while she goes off grazing. Dee (Aluinn de Haoine) is

now twenty-eight and given up having foals but she has always loved hers and anyone else's. I would often see patient Dee with three or four foals gambling round her while their mothers grazed in the distance. She never minds sharing her bucket of feed or pile of hay with the babies and is the greatest help at weaning time as the foals barely miss their mothers as long as they are with Dee.

Avery Schneider didn't know it, back on that cold March day, but the bay, Drogheda Cassey, was to become her new partner. Cassey came with some prior achievments in Alberta, having won many 2.9" Hunter Championships. Avery has been in Pony Club since she was six and she began taking lessons with Lucero in October, 2012. D.J. had been shown in Dressage down in Texas, prior to his arrival at Brian's. He then continued his training in

jumping. Jaelyn Boyd would be just the right young lady to appreciate his sweet disposition. **

The Manitoba Pony Club Spring Classic was paired with a MHJA show for the first time this past spring. It was a huge success and was felt by all that is should be repeated in 2015. Twinning the two shows made for a very busy and exciting time all weekend. Every ring at Birds Hill Park Equestrian Centre needed to be used, including the western ring. Quarry Ridge Farm, Stonewall

With dismay, we had noticed over the winter that Kieran was beginning to grow daddy long legs and we tried to ignore the uneven picture he and May Girl presented in their 2.6" first timed event, at the Brandon Pony Club Schooling Show last March. (They did really well together, in handling the addition of speed but May Girl's expression begged the question - what the heck is the rush?!!)

We finally had to admit it and Kieran was moved up to a bigger mount. (I think we need some Connemara x Warmbloods and Connemara x Thoroughbreds here in Manitoba, to offer as part breds for riders like Kieran, who grow so tall.) My heart was broken, as the McCullagh family show regularly and it kept May Girl, a Connemara, in the public eye. I walked around looking very glum, until Catherine told me that Meguire and Mae had begun taking lessons on May Girl, (who is still a green pony but hides it well) - and that both girls intended to enter the large and busy Stonewall Fair! Many show riders use the Fair, to warm-up for the upcoming show season. I couldn't wait for the two girls to compete on May Girl and was barely able to keep my excitement in check - and then came a very unwelcome phone call. My eye procedure was scheduled for the Friday of Fair weekend. Following the surgery, already swollen and sporting multicoloured bruising about both eyes - NO! Dr. Long did NOT think I should be going to go to the fair, NO; not even on the Sunday! Catherine McCullagh kept me informed of the progress Meguire and Mae

were making - they both did very well in the flat classes and in the Pony Hunters.

Mae Pinniger had caught the Show Bug hard and entered MHJA Summer Smiles, Summer in the City and Beach Party. She and May Girl began to forge a bond and continued to improve quickly very quickly! Ribbons were regularly jammed into dad's waiting hands. Is it pretty hard to hold onto a video camera at the same time Dr. Pinniger? Mae jumped into the big league, (pardon the pun) by entering the prestigious Heart of the Continent. I was very excited the night before, knowing that big semies hauling show jumpers in from out-ofprovince would already be at Red River Exhibition Show Grounds. On the first day, Mae and May Girl earned a 3rd. place in Open 2.6" Evergreen, against some very experienced riders (nineteen), many of them on horses. They managed to pull the rabbit out of the hat again on Sunday, going up against mostly horses, to finish 6th (sixteen). Catherine explained to me later what an Evergreen class is - and then I understood her great excitement about the May girls placing so well in the class!

The next event was the Manitoba Pony Club Championships and it promised something very special. It would be the first time I would get to see all four of our young Connemara riders competing at the same show. I had been teased since spring, by two Connemaras, three Connemaras, but never all four at once! I watched as each rider went into the ring; often with a bit of a lump in my throat but always with a feeling of great pride! Jaelyn and D.J. had progressed from their first show last spring and were now jumping a bit higher together. William and Cricket were their usual stellar selves. Avery and Cassey looked comfortable together and Mae was now a confident, as well as elegant rider. I missed seeing the Champions announced later on the Sunday afternoon but it was all over FB later that evening. ...something that is being maintained by our breeders. Having recently returned from Ireland where I saw many ponies, both at the show grounds & at several stud farms, I think we can be very proud of our Canadian bred Connemaras. Hopefully there will be enough young-stock to hold another inspection tour here soon.

Whilst in Clifden I was the Canadian Delegate at the ICCPS meeting. There were many topics bought to the table but the majority of them were to do with the EU & issues that do not affect us in Canada.

However a topic that Canada has had a huge impact on, HWSD was discussed . After a very lively & heated discussion it was agreed that this problem needs to be taken seriously.

There is more information on this disease in this newsletter. It is important to educate yourselves & to test your breeding stock. To put some minds to rest & answer a frequently asked question, no, ponies do not develop this over time. They are born with it. If your pony is unaffected now it always will be. However if you are planning to breed from your pony get the genetic test first as carriers are completely unaffected & likely have excellent feet!
